ESAM SUMMER STEM PROGRAM: BECOMING A YOUNG AVIATOR By Kevin Millington

ESAM will once again conduct its annual week-long "Becoming a Young Aviator" program from Monday, August 20 – Saturday August 25. The program, now in its fourth year, has been tremendously successful, and will again include a variety of hands-on learning experiences, including classes on the history of aviation, a tour of the museum, how planes fly, guest speakers, careers in aviation, development of a flight plan, and an actual flight!

Concurrent classes for two age groups, 8-12 years old, and 13-16 years old, will be conducted. The program is being undertaken in partnership with **Schenectady Country Community College**. **Rachel Rourke** will again be our EXCELLENT coordinator and ESAM volunteers, together with the **Experimental Aircraft Association**, will serve as mentors and teachers.

Cost of the program is \$150, and you can register for the week with SCCC – go to the web site at: <u>http://sunysccc.edu/coursex/ncreg.html</u>, switch the semester to summer and use code CRN# 60365 for the 8-12 year old class and CRN#60366 for the 12-16 year class. Once again, we will be offering a limited number of scholarships for the program, thanks to the **Zonta Club** and ESAM. It's going to be another busy and fun summer! ESAM VOLUNTEER IDENTIFIES A MISSING B-24 FROM WORLD WAR II

At the May 19th ESAM Breakfast, **ESAM volunteer Donna Esposito** gave a presentation about her recent trip to the South Pacific to research lost aircraft from World War II.


After orienting the audience to the geography of the South Pacific Theater, Donna focused her presentation largely on a US Army Air Force B-24 that went down after sustaining damage during a bombing raid over Rabaul. While in the South Pacific, she and **Justin Taylan** from the not-for-profit organization **Pacific Wrecks** surveyed the remains of a B-24 which had been located by locals in the jungle of the island of New Ireland. As it turns out, Donna was the individual who personally found the airplane's Construction Number that allowed the research group to positively identify which B-24 it was.

The plane was B-24 41-24186. It was assigned to the 13th Air Force, 5th Bomb Group, HQ Squadron. It was nicknamed "Pretty Prairie Special". On its last mission on December 30, 1943, it was flown by **Colonel Marian D. Unruh**, Commanding Officer of the 5th Bomb Group. On the mission it was intercepted by enemy fighters, sustained damage to its bomb bay doors, suffered at least two explosions and was reported to have ditched in the ocean. On December 31, five B-24s from the squadron went in search of the missing crew. They found and photographed eight survivors on a New Ireland beach, and dropped emergency supplies to them. However, when a PBY Catalina landed to rescue them on January 3, 1944, the downed crew was gone. As it turned out, the crew bailed out over the water before the aircraft crashed on New Ireland, so no human remains were found at the site of the crash. After the war it was found that nine crewmen survived the bailout but were captured by the Japanese. Six were executed, two died as Prisoners of War, and only Colonel Unruh survived to come home. The other two crewmen apparently didn't survive the bailout and are still listed as missing in action.

Donna continued her presentation by mentioning two other missing World War II pilots including a local man, **Lt. John A. Mancini** from Ballston Lake, NY. Lt Mancini took off from Guadalcanal on April 22, 1943 in an F-5 photo reconnaissance version of the P-38 and was never seen again.

She concluded her presentation by acknowledging the people and organizations that supported her trip, and by providing references for further research. Thanks, Donna for an outstanding presentation.

BOEING F/A-18 SUPER HORNET by Kevin Millington

The F/A-18 Super Hornet is a supersonic, carrier-based strike fighter currently in service with the U.S. Navy, and widely regarded as one of the very best multi-role fighters in the world. The Super Hornet is a larger, more sophisticated derivative of the F/A-18 Hornet, which has been in service with the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps since the mid-1980's.

While the original Hornet has been a very capable fighter, it has range and all-weather avionics limitations. Building on the success of the Hornet, Boeing (formerly McDonnell Douglas) developed a larger version during the mid 90's, being 25% larger, with 33% more internal fuel. In 1999, the Super Hornet entered operational service with the U.S. Navy, and by 2006 had replaced the F-14 Tomcat, supplementing and gradually replacing the "legacy" F/A-18 C and D Hornet within carrier air wings. The Super Hornet is equipped with an array of avionics, which allow it to perform a variety of missions, and both single-seat and two-seat versions are in service. In addition, the larger Super Hornet is able to carry more ordinance over a significantly greater range.

Although expensive, with a \$55 million price tag, the Super Hornet is truly a multi-role fighter able to perform numerous missions previously undertaken by separate aircraft types, including air supremacy, long-range all-weather ground attack, close air support, suppression of enemy air defenses, maritime strike, and aerial refueling. As a result, it has produced significant cost savings in terms of spare part and maintenance needs, and carrier air wings are now largely comprised of F/A-18 E and F Super Hornets and the "legacy" F/A -18 C and D Hornet. (More recently, another version, the EA-18G Growler has entered Navy service replacing the long-serving EA-6B Prowler in the electronic warfare role.) The Super Hornet is also one of the stealthiest fighters in the world, with a greatly reduced radar cross-section.

The Super Hornet is powered by two General Electric F-414 turbofan engines, which provide it with a maximum speed of 1,200 mph (Mach 1.8). With respect to armament, it is equipped with an internally-mounted 20 mm Vulcan cannon, and can carry up to 17,000 lbs. of ordinance on eleven under-wing and fuselage pylons, including the latest air-to-air and air-to ground munitions. To date, over 500 Super Hornets have been delivered to the U.S. Navy, equipping 34 squadrons.



PS – the Hornet and Super Hornet evolved from the Northrup YF-17 prototype of the 1970's, and its lineage with the Northrup F-5 is notable, including the distinctive leading edge wing-root extensions, as well as the trapezoidal wing. You can check it out, since ESAM prominently displays an F-5E in the Airpark!

ALEX AWARD NOMINATIONS DUE BY SEPTEMBER 12TH

Each year, one or more ESAM volunteers are presented with the Alex Award for their sustained and outstanding volunteerism. Named in memory of a truly great ESAM volunteer, **Roland ''Alex'' Alexander**, the award recognizes the volunteer's service, cooperation, teamwork and a dedicated pursuit of excellence.

The ESAM Board of Trustees is actively seeking applications for this year's nominees for the Alex Award. The Board of Trustees welcomes applications, which may be sent to the ESAM office. Applications must be received no later than September 12, 2018.

The application should clearly describe why the individual deserves the award, and must be from ESAM members who have worked with the individual. Therefore, the application is based on personal experience, rather than second-hand information. The application can be hand-written or typed and must provide the following information:

- The name of the nominee and a statement that he or she is an ESAM member in good standing
- The dates of the volunteer's service (must have been an active volunteer for a minimum of five years)
- A description of the personal qualities of the individual that demonstrate the characteristics of his or her pursuit of excellence
- A list of the activities in which the individual has been a participant
- A list of the individual's accomplishments supporting the development, operation and enhancement of ESAM and its mission
- The names of at least two ESAM members in good standing who have worked with the individual in an ESAM volunteer setting and who are making the nomination. The application must be signed and dated by the two members making the nomination.

The final choice of the recipient is a difficult one as there always are a number of outstanding representatives of Alex's qualities. We look forward to the challenge and the reward of recognizing another outstanding volunteer at the annual meeting in October.

ROGER HANNAY, IN MEMORIAM

The Empire State Aerosciences Museum regrets to announce the passing of **Roger Hannay**, the longtime CEO of Hannay Reels and Life Member of ESAM. His quiet, unassuming demeanor masked the huge impact he made during his lifetime. We all benefit from the United Military Council that he helped found. It made a big difference in the effort to maintain the 109th and its mission at the Schenectady Airport. As a veteran himself, Roger had a great concern for veterans and their services and took actions to help them whenever he could. He also loved planes and was a generous sponsor of ESAM's Air Shows and its Hangar dances. The hangar he rented from our FBO was orderly, impeccably clean and a model for how hangars should look. Many times he would provide ESAM with materials and financial assistance. As always, his help came without fanfare and many times even without being asked. He saw needs where they existed and tried to provide help.

Those of us who were counted among his friends were comforted by his notes of sympathy in times of sorrow, were assisted by his wise counsel for our problems and encouraged by his shared joy in our accomplishments. Roger Hannay was a remarkable man and will be sorely missed. ESAM send condolences to his family.

By adopting an airplane you, your business or your group are committing yourselves to (1) wash the airplane at least once a year and (2) do some painting on the airplane. You will do the work in the museum's Air Park under the direction of an ESAM Restoration Crew member sometime when the weather is warm. You will be given free admission to the museum when you work on the adopted airplane and ESAM will post a sign indicating that you have adopted the airplane. If you or your group are interested in adopting an airplane at ESAM, please contact the office at 518-377-2191, extension 10.

Here are some of the details. Work will be performed under the direction of a member of the ESAM Restoration Crew. Museum liability insurance will cover you while working on the airplane. ESAM will provide all needed supplies. Volunteers will not be allowed to climb on the airplanes. Annual fees are \$50 for individuals and nonprofit groups, and \$200 for businesses.
