Crabs growl using teeth in their stomach

Researchers revealed that a particularly grumpy type of crab scares off predators by growling at them using teeth in its stomach! The ghost crab or sand crab is a pale, sandy colour, making it almost invisible on the sand. They have one claw larger than the other and black eyes that are held aloft on stalks. The sounds, that are loud enough for people to hear, are made by both male and female ghost crabs during "aggressive interactions", scientists said. The rumbling is made by grinding teeth of the foregut and it is the first known instance of an animal using stomach sounds to communicate, and means their claws are free to attack. Biologist, Jennifer Taylor, said the abdominal vibrations were "definitely an advantage if a predator is up close. They can pull out their claws and be ready to lunge, but still produce these sounds."

100's of signals from outer space

China's largest telescope has picked up over 100 mysterious signals coming from an unknown source around three billion light years away from Earth. Scientists detected the signals with the Five-hundredmeter Aperture Spherical Radio Telescope (FAST), the world's most sensitive listening device, and they are carefully cross-checking and processing them, according to researchers at the National Astronomical Observatories of the Chinese Academy of Sciences (NAOC). The signals being detected are known as 'FRBs' (Fast Radio Bursts), which are small pulses of radio waves originating out in the cosmos. It's currently believed that FSBs are created by certain processes out in deep space, rather than from any kind of alien technology.
