Isaiah 66:18-21 INVITING ALL PEOPLE

The greatest music ever written appeals to people of every culture. People who do not speak a common language can all enjoy the same music. If the music is well written, it will touch the spirit of any human.

The same can be said of architecture, sculpture, and painting. People of all cultures connect with the same treasures. This is also true of many sports like soccer and athletic achievements like running a marathon.

It is also true of the gospel. The message of Jesus Christ appeals to believers all over the world because it proclaims the news that all can be saved.

In the prophecy of Isaiah, God promised to gather together people of every language. Representatives from Israel would go to foreign nations and distant coastlands. It is a bold vision proclaiming the universality of God's intent.

In both the Old and the New Testament, it slowly became evident that God intended to invite all people of all nations into a holy relationship.

How do you help God's work? Do you know the names of people at church? Do you invite your neighbors and friends? Do you introduce yourself to newcomers? Anyone can understand the Christian message, but first it must be heard.

THE WOMAN AT THE WELL: THIRSTING FOR TRUTH

Perhaps some of the greatest questions we can ask ourselves as believers are:

- ◆ IS MY FOLLOWING OF JESUS HALF-HEARTED, OR FULLY COMMITTED?
- ◆ AM I GUILTY OF PRESUMING GOD'S MERCY?
- ◆ DO I USE GOD'S PROMISE OF FORGIVENESS AS AN EXCUSE FOR BAD BEHAVIORS, HABITS, AND EVEN SINFULNESS?
- ◆ Do I ASSUME THAT BECAUSE I FOLLOW | ESUS, I SHOULD HAVE IT EASY?
- ◆ DO I GET ANGRY WITH GOD WHEN THINGS

 DO NOT GO MY WAY BECAUSE "I AM A


 GOOD PERSON?"
- ◆ Am I WILLING TO FOLLOW CHRIST EVEN THROUGH GREAT SUFFERINGS, TRIALS AND TRIBULATIONS?

Undoubtedly, we live in a culture where many people believe that all roads lead to God. As long as you are "sincere" or a "good person," it doesn't matter what you believe. Our Gospel today teaches the exact opposite. Like it or not, Jesus claimed to be THE ONLY way to God.

Many in our world today view Jesus as a "come as you are" Savior. Perhaps people want to believe this

because of fear. Perhaps most people truly desire a life of comfort and simply don't want to change. But when you read the New Testament, true discipleship is definitely NOT merely a "casual" relationship with Jesus (or a selective acceptance of His teaching). Rather, the cost of discipleship involves a sacrificial kind of love which commits the believer to Christ and to ALL that He teaches, both by word and example.

Jesus is warning us off of any false sense of entitlement. Like the lews, we too can feel too comfortable in the belief that God is somehow obliged to save us. What counts is not our past exploits or successes, but rather being with the Master at all times. Our eternity depends on the outcome of our encounter with Christ. HE is the means by which we are saved. Salvation depends on whether or not we truly "know" Jesus. A major evidence of such a relationship is that we are growing in holiness, not just outwardly, but in our hearts. Simply claiming to have spent time with Him doesn't count.



The concept of the "narrow door" can be absolutely terrifying. Jesus didn't say, "Stroll through the big door sometime when you're not doing anything else and check it out." He says, "Strive to enter by the narrow door." Although this passage has given way to all sorts of false spiritualties, Jesus is saying that we should take up our cross and strive to follow HIM every day. It is the cross that will bring us joy and everlasting life. Jesus isn't talking

about salvation by works or human effort, but He is talking about our attitude toward it. While salvation is a gift of God, it is clear that God expects us to cherish it as an athlete cherishes the victor's crown - suggesting that we need an athlete's discipline and determination in pursuing entrance through the narrow door.

Even though the door to God's kingdom may be narrow, (due to the degree of commitment required), it is open and available to everyone. People will come to it from east and west, from north and south from everywhere, in short. Those who 'stand outside' are those who refuse to accept the reign of peace and justice, joy and love, which God so graciously and freely offers to everyone. Unlike Jesus, we seem very often too concerned about numbers as if that is the most important sign of the presence of the Kingdom and of its power to save the world. Rather than on numbers, lesus asks us to concentrate on our own personal and authentic relationship with Christ in order to enter through the narrow door.

He also foretells that we will be surprised by those who enter and those who don't. However hard we try, we often find ourselves excluding persons or groups from salvation. Jesus invites us to be wary of judging others, and to believe that all CAN be open to God's loving offer of salvation.

The door is still open! Strive to enter it with only Christ as your guide.

Christ's peace and our Mother Mary's love, Mary Sampey WELCOME THE STRANGER. We have become accustomed to hearing stories on the news about people fleeing violence and destruction in their own countries, trying to make their way to a safe place. We have also seen the reactions of those who fail to welcome the stranger and the helpless children. In the

three readings for this day, we are told that we are to welcome strangers, to welcome the Lord's discipline,



which leads to peace, and to "strive to enter through the narrow gate" into the glory of God's own homeland, the reign of God.

TAKING A STEP BACK ... Every now and then life affords one the opportunity to step back and look at things in a different light. This past Sunday was one such moment for me. I had 9am Mass in Dunbar after which I headed to Immaculate Conception to celebrate a baptism after the 9:30 Mass. From there I ran down the hill for the I I:30 Mass during which I was baptising another baby.

As I walked through Saint John's prior to Mass I noticed faces I was shocked to see HERE; it was a family I knew well from Saint Barbara in Harrison City. When I inquired as to what brought them to the Jewel of the Yough they informed me that they were on their way back from Deep Creek. Some minutes later, as I was standing in the narthex waiting to begin the procession, another family of "new faces" walked through the door. I likewise recognised as they had occasionally attended Mass at another one of my former parishes (although they weren't members there); they basically - in not so many words - admitted that they were "church shopping."

When I reached the Chair and looked out over the full church (the congregation swelled by even MORE visitors attending for the baptism) I suddenly felt the VIBRANCY of the Our Lady, Queen of the Yough Community. And I hope that all our visitors felt it too! As the Mass progressed there were even MORE signs of the amazing reality of our community.

The singing was led by one of our exceptional cantors, Bethany Coldren, who is still at university. One of the three Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion was also a young adult in her 20s, Julianne Speeney (the other two EMHCs were also relatively young (one in their 40s, one in their 50s). The Lector, Carolyn Petrasun, was but a year into her 50s (I thought she was 10 years younger). Then there was our FABULOUS Saint John sacristan, Erin Knizner, barely 40 - but looking much younger than that!

By the time Mass was ended the cockles of my heart were warmed SO MUCH that I was **BURNING** inside. (Jesus DID say in the Gospel that He came to set a fire!) I was overjoyed at the young and vibrant face our community presented to all who happened to be visiting that day. Let's face it - in the minds of MANY in today's world church is some sedate thing for "old people" and has **NOTHING** to do with the vibrancy of youth. Well, "world" here in the Connellsville-Dunbar metroplex nothing could be further from the truth! Reflecting on the full house at 9 in Dunbar that morning only added fuel to the fire RAGING within me! Truly I am BLESSED to be a part of such a VIBRANT community. And I am ETERNALLY thankful to all the people who bring LIFE to us.

Unpacking Sunday's experience took me back to one of the Pittsburgh Leadership Foundation (PLF) sessions from a few years back. Lee Kricher, the pastor of Amplify Church in Pittsburgh's North Hills, shared how his church made a CONSCIOUS **CHOICE** to fill as many of the visible ministry roles at a service with people in their 20s. They deliberately wanted to present

a YOUNG face so as to attract younger "seekers" to worship. Older parishioners weren't sidelined; they willingly bought into the vision of the church leadership and assumed more behind-the-scenes roles. I don't necessarily think that we could transplant this model COMPLETELY into a Catholic setting (PLEASE do NOT think I am downplaying the ministry of our older parishioners!); however I DO believe that we SHOULD make every effort possible to involve younger parishioners in our ministries.

(The caterpillar pictured has a palate even more picky than MINE; it will **ONLY** feed on milkweed.) I am not AT ALL enamoured of bugs but knowing that this gross caterpillar will soon transform into a **BEAUTIFUL** Monarch Butterfly was enough incentive to capture its portrait.

For ages the butterfly has been used as an analogy of the Christian life. We spend this time "here below" as a caterpillar (gross and YUCKY!) awaiting the time when we are TRANSFORMED into a new creation, soaring to heights unimaginable NOT through our own efforts but by the free gift of a Saviour who has opened the way for us to a new - and ETERNAL - life.
