

STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE. Due to an early print deadline for Independence Day, the collection report for JUN 29-30 will be in next week's bulletin.

UNDERSTANDING STEWARDSHIP CHANGES EVERYTHING. The reality is that many people today, including many Christians, don't understand the true meaning of stewardship. And that's a tragedy. Why? It's the first assignment God gave the human race in Genesis 1:28. That's when God told Adam and Eve to "have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over every living thing that moves on the earth".

Stewardship is managing God's blessings in God's way for God's glory. See, the Bible tells us in Psalm 24:1 that He owns it all: "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof". And if He's the owner, that means we're not. Instead, we're His stewards - His managers. God commands us to be stewards over everything He blesses us with. Everything. That means our time, talents, treasure, relationships, jobs and, yes, stuff. It's all God's, and He trusts us with it.

Did you catch that? We get to manage all of the *Creator's* stuff. How awesome is that? It's both an honor and a serious responsibility! When we get that in our spirit, well, it changes things. It changes our perspective on our family budgets, our daily decisions, even our purpose in life. When we understand true, biblical stewardship, the trajectories of our lives change with every decision we make.

We begin to build a legacy of stewardship in our families. We treat our spouses and kids differently. We approach our work with a new sense of purpose. We become grateful for everything we have. We live within our means. We have more money to give. And we have hope for the future.

I'm here to tell you that I want to reclaim the word stewardship in the church today. But it's up to all of us to make sure every believer understands God's role as owner and our role as stewards. When we get to heaven and have to give an account of how we managed God's resources (I Corinthians 4:2), I hope God will reply to all of us, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Galatians 6:14-18 SCAR TISSUE

"Would you like to see my scar?" We hear this question from some people who've had surgery, scraped the road from their motorcycle, or suffered a wound in war. Sometimes they are more anxious to show it than we are to see it.

The reverse happens too. We would like to see a scar, but the person - for private reasons - chooses not to show it.

We all carry scars. Some are physical and quite visible. Others are well concealed. Some scars are emotional. They make themselves known even when we wish they did not. And some of our scars make us who we are. They are signs of our resilience, of the ill-intent of enemies, of moments of foolishness, or times of unimaginable bravery. For some of us, our biography is the story of our scars.

St. Paul tells the Galatians, "I bear the marks of Jesus on my body." Paul had his share of physical and emotional pain, and he carried scars. They were not signs of hurt and pain, not signs of foolishness or bravery, not signs of illness or treachery. They were signs of Jesus. Because of Jesus, Paul endured all things. His scars told less about the tenacity of Paul, and more about the faithfulness of Christ.

Where are your scars? What and whom do they represent? Do you conceal them? Or do you ask, "Would you like to see my scar?"



Today's readings celebrate God's providence. No matter how wonderful (or heartbreaking) our relationships are, God always provides for us. No one cares for us the way God does. Isaiah shares with us a deeply intimate image of God caring for us "as a mother comforts her child." The prophet describes us not as the usual "children of God," but as "babies." We

should not resist this image, but rejoice in it. Trusting in God's care, we can all let down our guard and rest like infants in the lap of our mother.

St. Paul's trust in God allows him to be at peace like this. He boldly declares that no one can "make troubles" for him, because he has given himself completely to Jesus. And when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, he challenges them not to provide for themselves, but to let faith be their guide.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION. It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are "among the missing."

Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as

DON'T TAKE A to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations VACATION are. In answering the call, they keep the "sabbatical" FROM CHURCH rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship.

For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshiping together on Sundays. They responded, "Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live." By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life.



"I know lesus is always in the tabernacle, Pastor Al, but most of all I love knowing He's always in here."



Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by

prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Phil 4:6-7

So often in the midst of trials, we ask "why me?". God doesn't promise that we won't have trials or transitions or times where we don't understand, but He DOES promise that in every situation we have access to a peace that passes our understanding and will guard our hearts and minds in the process of waiting on Him.

So, this week ask the Lord, "God will you give me your peace in this situation?" Just watch and see what the Lord does!

FINANCIAL REALITIES...THE DISCUSSION **CONTINUES, PT 2:** I ended last week by stating that "In the eyes of many I have FOOLISHLY bent over backwards to keep THREE parishes ALIVE." Of course there I was speaking strictly of the parishes within the city limits of Connellsville; the truth is I am now "bending over backwards" to keep FOUR parishes alive. **MADNESS!** At least from a purely BUSINESS perspective. Realising that many parishioners are perfectly fine with the idea of closing churches. As long as it isn't **THEIR** church getting the ax! Which, of course, is a natural human reaction and I can't fault people for FEELING that way. At least **INITIALLY**. However, if we are going to survive as a strong community into the future we **MUST** put aside narrowly-focused parochialism and work together for the GREATER GOOD. (Not to mention the GLORY OF GOD. which is the one and ONLY reason we exist in the first place!)

Fifty years ago the area now encompassed by Our Lady, Queen of the Yough boasted **NINE** churches; in addition to the four extant churches there were Saint Emory and Holy Trinity in the city, Sacred Heart in Dawson, Saint Vincent de Paul in Leisenring, and Saint Polycarp in West Leisenring. In one sense those were our GLORY YEARS. But it would be a mistake to simply look back and lament what is no more. Rather I believe the Lord is challenging us to look FORWARD and actively work together to create a **NEW** age of glory. I - for one - have NO DOUBT this can be achieved. It will, though, require **ALL** of us - MYSELF IN-CLUDED - to forego the desire to

hang on to a past that is - and will be - NO MORE.

Now I am going to ask, no BEG, you to pay **VERY CLOSE AT- TENTION** to what I am going to write next. To make sure that you DO NOT miss it I am going to write it in all caps AND bold print. Get it? I am trying to alert you to the IMPORTANCE of what I am about to say! To wit,

NOTHING ABOVE SHOULD BE INTERPRET-ED AS YOUR PASTOR ANNOUNCING THAT THE CLOSURE OF A CHURCH OR CHURCH-ES IS IMMINENT. I KNOW HOW PEOPLE LIKE TO READ INTO MY WORDS. Now please stop here and slowly RE-READ the above bold print paragraph.

OK, now go back and for a third time VERY CAREFULLY read the above bold print paragraph. Then repeat - as **OFTEN AS IS NEC-ESSARY** - until you rid yourself of any delusions that I am on the verge of closing a church or churches in our community. Thank you.
