TCC Heads to Trenton Hall This Fall

"You will learn from an incredible musician how to build relationships and make a children's choir sound great. This partnership will set us apart from other colleges and universities in the state." Dr. Nick McBride, Assistant Professor of Choral Music Education at The College of New Jersey (TCNJ), addressed eager music education students as he leaned against the grand piano in the choral rehearsal room of TCNJ's music building - the nuclear site of a new partnership between TCNJ and TCC.

This fall, Chorale students will trek through Trenton Hall on their way to rehearsal with TCNJ students beginning October 10. Each week, the high schoolers will experience the excitement and discovery that is characteristic of TCNJ's campus, while preparing performances with the support of Thel and McBride, who will serve as co-directors of the ensemble this season. The opportunity for performances, both on and off campus, between TCC and TCNJ Music ensembles, are expected fruit of this artistic collaboration.

The *pièce de résistance* will manifest in a formal interactive choral methods course for TCNJ students, to run concurrently with the TCC Chorale schedule. TCNJ music education majors will receive invaluable hands-on opportunities to lead warmups, sectionals and additional student teaching opportunities through the relationships they build with the Chorale students. Patty Thel stood next to McBride as she relayed to his students how this experience will propel the course of their studies:

"Students teach me the most because I face or hear something I haven't before, and that challenges me to learn something new. One-on-one contact is the fulcrum of your teaching; the things that you do that seem small end up very meaningful to a child. This experience will make a difference in your life and a difference in your teaching."

Alumni Spotlight: Sydney Williams, Class of 2011

ydney Williams, TCC graduating class of 2011, is making a major impact as a mental health counselor at Trenton Central High School. Her role includes supporting students through major changes in their lives, making sure that students are "emotionally and socially ready for school," and creating a sense of general mental wellness that they can carry throughout their lives.

Mental health counseling became a life path for Sydney after she completed an internship at Wellingborough High School. She took her passion and pursued a BA in Psychology from Bloomfield College, graduating in 2015; and later received a master's degree in Critical Health Counseling at Kean University, and has been at Trenton Central supporting children ever since.

Sydney was a member of the TCC for nine years. Through TCC, she was giving opportunities to sing in and visit Boston, MA and multiple cities in Virginia. These choral excursions developed in Sydney an "immense wanderlust," that she continues to cultivate as an adult.

Sydney claims that she developed her skills of time management, scheduling, and work ethic as a member of TCC. She elaborated further, saying that being in multiple ensembles, juggling school, and then helping out with housework prepared her for the intensity of her counseling job.

Drumming: A Laboratory for Leadership

rumming has always been an essential part of the TCC curriculum, building confidence in students using rhythm, improvisation and live performance. This year, it has been made into a stand-alone ensemble class on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 5:45 p.m., lead by Eric Thomas.

When asked about drum lab, Mr. Thomas spoke about the joy of bringing out the best in students: "Music is about expression to me, whether it is someone performing on their own or with other musicians to convey an expansive feeling or message to others who are listening. Once a student knows how to play a particular drum or instrument, I want to help them to express themselves through the instrument; they themselves are part of the overall expression of the song. When a student is playing on their own, it is about what they are feeling and bringing [that feeling] out."

According to Mr. Thomas, drum lab serves as an inspiration to many students, even encouraging students to begin playing other instruments. One student in particular, Tobias Richardson, began as a drumming student, and through exposure to other instruments in drum class and at home, became an "outstanding bassist (Thomas). Mr. Thomas also stresses the importance of both the piano lab and drum lab, as it allows students to "appreciate what I do, JoAnn, and the other musicians who accompany the choirs. Hopefully any percussion added to the songs selected by the different choir directors expands the musical message through the voices of TCC from our youngest members to our high school students."



Summer Springs to Life in Music, Theatre, and Discovery

his summer, nearly 40 TCC members further cultivated their gifts, skills, and character in the phenomenal summer camps offered by The Lawrenceville School, McCarter Theatre, RU-4H, Watershed Nature Camp, and Westminster Choir College.

Eight of these students continued the tradition of TCC members attending Westminster Choir College's Vocal Institute. Malachi Stewart, a recipient of the Princeton Friends of Opera scholarship, was thrilled to participate in the Insti-

tute. The musical community seemed to be a focal point of Malachi's time, who said that his favorite experiences were "doing group activities and making new friends, meeting the counselors, and performing in the final concert." Malachi's voice grew more excited as he spoke about the piano and vocal instruction, where he learned about harmonic structures, language pronunciation, and new breathing techniques. Being involved in TCC, Stewart felt extremely prepared for his summer at the Institute, saying that TCC prepared him to excel in music theory, reading, singing posture, breathing, and enunciation.

Gabby Lightner has been a member of TCC for eight years, and this past summer, she attended the High School Intensive Music Theater Lab at the McCarter Theater. This particular program focuses on creating new works. This past summer, students worked with a team of professionals to devise the script for a brand new musical, featuring songs by McCarter artists and inspired by characters from Greek mythology. The final product was a musical featuring different scenes and Greek storylines connected by the opening of Pandora's Box.
