Year Band News

Tots:

This week in Tiny Tots the children have continued their autumn theme by exploring the tuff tray filled with Autumn objects such as leaves, sticks, conkers and pine cones. The children have also loved getting messy with slippery gloop!

This week in Little Tots the children have been looking at harvest. In the garden the children have been harvesting autumn vegetables in the digging pit.

They have also been using vegetables to create pictures by dipping them in paint and printing the vegetable onto the paper. The Little Tots children have had so much fun exploring the messy jelly play!

This week in Big Tots we have been looking at hibernation and the different animals that hibernate in winter. In the construction area the children have built different houses for the animals using sticks leaves and stones. We have also created our own hedgehogs using salt dough and match sticks. In the garden this week we have been on a hedgehog hunt look for numbered hedgehogs hidden around the garden.

<u>Year 1</u>

This week in Year 1 we have really enjoyed writing our recounts all about our trip to RAF Cosford. We had so much fun looking at the aeroplanes and making our very own parachutes; we tested them too!

In Maths we have continued looking at subtraction – using the Numicon to help us and have completed our weekly Maths Challenge based around addition and subtraction.



Safeguarding in the Curriculum

How To Keep Safe

Year 2 have continued to make links between the Fire of London and how to keep themselves safe. The children carried out a learning walk that focused on fire safety, asked the fire officer questions and wrote instructions.

PCSO Kate Easthope visited Year 1 and 2 to talk to them about ways to keep themselves safe including fire, water, road safety and stranger danger. The children had lots of very sensible ideas of how to keep themselves safe and learnt that a stranger is someone they do not know, to stay close to their trusted adults, not to play near canals or open water, how to call for help if a friend fell in the water, how to cross the road safely and how to keep safe around fires and fireworks.

Challenge: parents, ask your child if they can remember their own address. If they get lost or need to call 999 they need to know this vital bit of information.

Peer Pressure

On Monday PCSOs Kate and Becky worked with Year 6 to increase their understanding of 'peer pressure' and gave lots of good advice if children find themselves being pressured by their peers or children older than themselves.

Group discussions decided that peer pressure is not a good thing, it is being forced to do something & there might be a consequence. Children were very clear that peer pressure involves a need to fit into a group.

Advice:

- * Choose your trusted friends wisely.
- Surround yourself with people who accept who you are!
- Think of the consequences make wise choices.
- * Consider if your actions translate into right or wrong.

Safeguarding Information

Children Missing In Education

School education plays a vital foundation in a child's life. Research proves the link between regular school attendance and educational progress and attainment. Franche Community Primary School recognises that a child may become missing from education. Procedures are in place to obtain information when children move out of an area, go abroad or arrive at school to obtain a place from another area.

Who are the children at risk of missing education?

Children of compulsory school age who are:

- * Not on a school roll or who are not receiving a full-time education;
- * Identified as having been out of educational provision for a period of time.

Children go missing from education for a number of reasons:

- Failure to secure a school place after moving to a new area;
- Removed by their parent/carers;
- * They do not start school at the appropriate time and so do not enter the education system.

Franche Primary School's response to children missing education:

- * Attendance is monitored daily;
- * The Designated Safeguarding Lead and Attendance Officer will make reasonable enquiries to establish the child's whereabouts ie daily phone calls and/or safe and well checks to the family home;
- Franche will inform the Local Authority if a child has missed ten consecutive school days.

The internet is amazing! Children can play, learn, create and connect - opening up a whole world of exciting possibilities. But with the digital world changing all the time, how can you make sure your child's staying safe?





Live streaming is the broadcasting of **live video** to an audience over the internet. It can also be a one-on-one live video chat. Unlike pre-recorded videos that can be cut and edited, live streaming is just that – live and uncensored.

It's appealing as it gives young people the chance to be creators, presenters and to be seen and heard by an audience. Many of our children are doing this on various apps and platforms. When used in positive ways, live streaming is an excellent tool for young people to create identity and develop confidence and communication skills. It also enables them to gain insight into their own favourite celebrity speakers or live streamers. However, as with anything, there are risks. Type in the name of any app or game and it will provide you with a summary of what it does, why children like it and any risks it might pose to your child when they are using it. It details the various parental controls and how best to apply them and it also explains how to block and report users on each app and game. If children are feeling intimidated or upset by another user, this is the first thing to do and it allows them to have control over who they do and do not interact with. Check it out and have a chat with your child about what they are using and why they enjoy itmaybe you'll enjoy it too!

Year 2

Another exciting week in Year 2. In Maths, the children have been looking at addition and applying the Concrete. Pictorial and Abstract (CPA) approach to develop a deeper understanding of addition. They have been looking at adding two-digit with one and twodigit numbers.

In addition to this, in Computing, the pupils have had a go at problem solving with algorithms. The children had to assist Bee in

reaching the flower beds. The children used their knowledge of position and direction to support this.

Finally, as part of our topic during Reflection Time, the children have been discussing the following question, Would you let a stranger join you on your boat? The children have been considering different opinions and suggestions of others, listening to their reasons of their choice. What would you decide?

Year 3

This week, the children have reflected on what life would have been like to be a child during WW2 by listening to an air-raid siren and bombs dropping. In Guided Reading, each class has practised and performed their own verses from the poem 'Evacuation' by Angela Wybrow. You can watch this now on our school YouTube page! Throughout the week, we have been building on our geographical knowledge of cities in the UK by finding the main cities that children would have been evacuated to and from during the war.

Year 4

This week, the children have been learning about famous leaders during the Roman times and using what they have learnt to pick their favourite

and most successful Emperor. They have also been starting to make their Roman quiz on 'Scratch'. In our Maths lessons, we have started to focus on the compact method for addition. During our Science lessons, we have been exploring

rates of evaporation and setting up an experiment to test our predictions. Ask your child what we found out!

Year 5

This week our maths learning has been on the topic of statistics and in particular, line graphs. By developing our understanding of how to plot these graphs we were able to compare how our pulse rates changed whilst participating in a Body Coach workout. Our English has taken us further into the world of dragons alongside our art, which has seen us develop our ability to create reflections and shading as well as printing to produce our dragon skins.

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have continued practising their debating skills by learning the correct language to use and the different positions, such as the speaker. A debate was then held about whether children should be First Aid trained. In our Maths lessons, we have started looking at long multiplication and short division and applied this learning to solve word problems. During our Science lessons, we have drawn flow charts to help explain the process of how fossils are formed.




