F.A. Cup 1st Qualifying Round (Tuesday, September 15th, 2009)

Once again Lady Luck decided not to reward the Hammers in a game, that at times they had more than held their own. This against a team from a higher League, and being forced to play two thirds of the game with only ten men after James Merritt had been harshly sent off for retaliation. They also lost their Keeper Ed Roberts after fifty seven minutes, but his substitute Adam Tong turned in a commendable performance including a penalty save. Max Crowe thought he had equalized with ten minutes to go, but once again the Referee harshly ruled that he had handled much to the amazement of most people watching.

The Hammers started the game well carrying on from their very good, but luckless display against the Poppies in mid week. With just two minutes gone a good run down the left wing, and cross by Richard Jackson found Jack Swann. His effort was well saved by the Bridgwater Keeper. Five minutes later following a good run by Max Crowe, Swann again had a chance to give United the lead, but this time fired just wide. The Town gradually came more into the game, and following a succession of corners took the lead in the 18th minute. The goal came directly from the corner Kick that evaded everybody, and found the top far corner of the net. Hamworthy came straight back at the opposition, and the Bridgewater Keeper could only palm down a cross to Ryan Dovell whose shot was cleared off the line. United were not to be denied, and were soon back on level terms. Another Richard Jackson run and cross found Jack Swann at the far post. He laid the ball back for Stuart Cannie to score the much deserved eqaliser in thec23rd minute. The game was now much more even, but disaster was to strike

when Hamworthy were reduced to ten men following Merrit's red card nine minutes before the break. A flurry of Town activity forced the Hammers on the defensive until the Half Time whistle came.

HT 1-1

Having only ten men meant that the second half was always going to be difficult. Defender Mike Antrobus replaced Marc Jackson to help out at the back. The Hammer's cause was also not helped when Keeper Ed Roberts had to leave the field through injury. His replacement Adam Tong was soon in action making the first of many good saves, and he went on to complete a fine match. Despite some resolute Hamworthy defending Bridgwater's pressure at last paid dividends when they scored from a far post header in the sixty first minute. With just ten minutes remaining a quick Hamworthy break finished with Max Crow hammering the ball past the Town Keeper for what everybody thought was the equalizer. Any celebration was short lived however when the Referee ruled the goal out for a hand ball. This had been missed by most other people including the Bridgwater players who had not appealed. With five minutes to go the Home side was awarded a penalty for a foul just inside the box, but Adam Tong did well to save from the spot. In the last minute of the game Bridgwater got their third goal which was a bit cruel on a brave depleted Hamworthy effort. They were left to ponder what the result may have been with a full first choice United side with no injuries, but that would only be speculation, and the fact was they were out of the FA Cup.

United arrived at Test Park hoping to start the season with a win against their newly re-named hosts. Although the Hammers have suffered some embarrassing defeats there in recent years, catching the notorious slow starters so early in the campaign could be to their advantage. Matt Steer and Tony Rolls were serving out suspensions from their previous clubs. However with the influential Eddie Hodge returning, boss Alan Lay was still able to utilise a strong squad.

Early goal sets the tone

It took only 8 minutes for the much stronger looking United to open their account. A slick passing move down the left wing involving Lee Francis, Jamie Gleeson and Harry Cooper set up an opening for Dann Cann who cut in for a deadly finish into the far corner of the net. Five minutes later the Hammers doubled their lead. Jamie Filkins slotted the ball down the right touchline into the path of Cann. The United man easily ousted his defender, before his teasing low ball across the goal took out the keeper, and was then smashed into the gaping net by Cameron Beard at the far post. In the eighteenth minute Beard completed his double. Receiving the ball from James Guthrie, and with options to pass, but he instead tried his luck from distance. A splendid strike it was too, powering into the bottom left corner of the net. The Hammers were now in complete control, and had several near misses before Dan Cann completed his own brace on 42 minutes. This was after Lee Francis's shot fell conveniently into his path off a defender. The United man again powerfully struck the ball home at the far post.

Dann Cann and Beard seal their hattricks

The students gave themselves a lifeline in the first minute of the restart,

Tam Demunga taking advantage of a rare lack of concentration at the back to find the net. However, normal service resumed for the Hammers on 55 minutes. A precise ball played into the danger area by Eddie Hodge set up Dann Cann for his hat-trick, forcing the ball home to the left of the exposed keeper. Hamworthy made it six in the 62nd minute. Another well crafted ball by Hodge was met by a cheeky back-heel just outside penalty area by Cann, right into the path of Cameron Beard Beard duly stroked the ball home just inside the far post to complete the second hat-trick of the afternoon for the rampant visitors. Substitute Harrison White completed Solent's misery on 80 minutes driving the ball from distance into the bottom left hand corner after good work by Brandon Randall and Beard.

The beleaguered Solent keeper Alex Londors could finally hold his head high on 85 minutes. He produced a quite remarkable save to claw out Brandon Randall's close range bullet shot. Play immediately switched to the other end, Jones getting down quickly to claw out Demunga's low strike, before substitute Luke Bennett fired the rebound just over the bar.

United's hoodoo at Test Park was finally put to bed in emphatic style, all the players working for each other, and using the widths well. In particular Lee Francis and Eddie Hodge, controlled much of the game, and Jamie Gleeson covered an enormous amount of ground. To be fair it must be taken into account that the student side looked fairly young, and at times it was almost literally "men v boys". However they tried their best and never gave up, despite lacking the strength and stamina of Hamworthy - but their days will surely come later in the season.



This fixture had no shortage of billing. Neighbours Poppies ended the last campaign in a high, but perhaps surprisingly third place in the League. This was three points and three positions above the Hammers. In the league games between the two Clubs, each team won their home leg handsomely. However, almost all of that Bournemouth squad have now moved on to new Clubs including some to the Hammers. United's Sam Jones and Harry Cooper would now be facing their old club, with The Poppies fielding ex-United favourite Edgar Zanin. United also have many other new faces in their Squad, and would been hoping to build on their emphatic start to the season at Solent University last Saturday.

The game started at a good pace. Louis Coulson, after shrugging off Declan Randall's challenge had a

decent effort saved by Sam Jones at his near post. On the quarter hour Dan Cann saw his free kick from just outside the penalty area beat the four man wall, but it was well read by Poppies' stopper James Mayo. A few minutes later Cann's superb finish from Eddie Hodge's cross did find the net, but the flag had gone up for offside. Poppies' man Edgar Zanin then finished a good run with a weak shot that was easily saved by Jones. Play again switched to the other end, and Cann found himself with space in front of goal, but he just failed to connect with Jamie Gleeson's long diagonal ball, and it was gathered by a relieved Mayo.

Cann then made it a trio of near misses, seeing his close range header from Gleeson's corner, headed off the line by Poppies' captain Lewis Harvey. Despite the blank score sheet at the interval, the first half had been played with good intensity. The Hammers probably had the edge, but the Poppies' game plan to get men behind the ball, and close down quickly saw to it that United's final path to goal was repeatedly blocked despite their industrious approach play. The game now really in need of a goal

It took only five minutes after the restart for that goal to come, but few would have envisaged the circumstances. There seemed little danger when Poppies' man Jake Harvey sent in a low cross. However Jack Voisey had been left completely unmarked, and was able to tap

the ball into the net past Jones to give Bournemouth the lead. Paradoxically, the goal injected new vigour into United's attacks, and they were back on level terms on the hour mark. Substitute Brandon Randall, who had just come on, did well to convert a low cross at the far post that had been put in by Dan Cann. Although Poppies were always a threat on the counter.

Hamworthy always looked the more assured, and a second goal for them was always on the cards. It finally arrived in the 85th minute, when substitute Matt Steer's well floated free kick was headed into the top far corner of the net by Cameron Beard, Beard almost added another a minute later. After being put clean through by Steer, he saw his shot from the edge of the area beat the onrushing Mayo, but it went just wide. In the 89th minute Poppies' Levi Ridealah was shown a second yellow card. This was for a poor challenge on Harrison White, having already been reprimanded early in the half for clattering into the leg of United keeper Sam Jones.

Hamworthy comfortably coped with some late Poppies' pressure to claim the points, and the derby bragging rights. They also kept their pole position in the league. Few would dispute the hosts deserved the win for their second half performance, but they were made to work for it all the way by a determined new look Bournemouth outfit



BASHLEY F.C.

Founded in 1947. Bashley FC joined the Bournemouth League in 1950 and left in 1983 to join the Hampshire League. In 1986 they became founder members of the Wessex League and won the title for next three seasons. In 1987-88 Bashley reached the semi-finals of the FA Vase, losing narrowly to Emley.

In 1989 the club joined the Southern League Southern Division and won the title in their first season. The following season in the Premier Division Bash were in contention for promotion to the Conference but finished in fourth place. The club's rise came to an end two years later with relegation back to the Southern Division.

Bashley reached the FA Cup First Round proper for the first time in 1994/95 and won 1-0 at Chesham. A Second-Round home tie with Swansea ended with a 1-0 defeat, with Bash came close to causing a huge upset.

August 1997 Bash appointed ex-European Cup winner Jimmy Case as manager. They were promotion challengers during 1997-98, but eventually finished third, with a good FA Trophy run into the last sixteen, losing narrowly at Conference side Hayes.

Another FA restructure saw Bash back in the Southern League South and West Division. They enjoyed a record-breaking season, winning the league by 28 points and achieving a rare double century of 102 points and 111 goals, including a spell of 27 League matches unbeaten. Promotion was an all-round team effort, Bash having the most prolific attack and the meanest defence in the league. Richard Gillespie finished up with 41 goals, the highest total in any of the Southern League divisions and broke the club all time goal-scoring record held by Colin Cummings, which had stood for over thirty years.

Bashley acquitted themselves well in the Southern Premier and finished in fifth place.

2007-08 ended in disappointment with a 4-1 defeat by Team Bath in the play-off semi-final.

In 2009/10 Bash just missed out on a top five finish on final day of the season. An FA Trophy run saw Bash eventually lose to Conference National side, Crawley Town.

Paul Gazzard and Stewart Kearn took over the managerial hot seats in 2013-14. Results did not go for Bashley, players departed and Kearn stepped down. John Pyatt joined Gazzard to try and stave off relegation. The club was relegated to the South and West Division and were lucky to survive the season.

Andy Darnton, Graham Speechley-Price, Martin Spiers and Dominic Cuncliffe all had brief spells as manager before Speechley-Price took over as caretaker manager in February 2015. The club battled on but finished bottom and were relegated. Andy Howard took the reserves to the 2014-15 Wyvern League title.

The FA reprieved Bashley, ensuring Southern League football. Ex league player David Stride became manager, only to be replaced by Steve Riley. Riley resigned

following a run of defeats and Tom
Prodomo took charge. The season
ended with no wins, two draws.

a bottom finish and relegation to the Wessex League. Season highlight was the 1-0 FA Trophy win against Cinderford, eventual S&W champions.

The 2016-7 campaign, Bashley's first season back in the Wessex for many years, resulted

in a 14th place finish. Álmost at the end of that season manager Tom Prodomo departed for Weymouth. Bashley promoted from within with former assistant manager Paul Morris taking over in the manager's hot seat for the 2017-18 season.

IN MEMORY OF KEITH HILL

This week saw the unfortunate passing of Bashley Legend Keith Hill. Keith was well known to all non-league fans and will be truly missed by all. We've taken the following article from the Advertiser & Times newspaper.

TRIBUTES have flooded in for legendary Bashley Football Club fan Keith Hill after he lost his brave battle against cancer.

Known as Mr Bashley and loved by fans and players alike. Keith was famous for singing loudly on the stands during his beloved team's games - sometimes not stopping for the whole 90 minutes.

Keith was a butcher by trade and worked at Danestream Farm shop. He was married to Lynda with whom he had children Stacey and Matt.

This week Bashley FC tweeted news of his death saying: "Bashley FC is deeply saddened to announce the passing of Keith Hill today. Keith was well known for being Bashley through and through.

"He followed them and sang his heart out home and away. Keith was always willing to help others and would always share his away day stories and memories with the officials being a constant inclusion.

"We haven't only lost a good one... we have lost one of the best ones. You and your family will forever have a place with Bashley FC. We send our thoughts and condolences to Lynda, Stacey and Matt at this sad time."

The announcement by the Wessex League Premier Division club - known as the

Stags - was followed by an outpouring of condolences from other clubs, fans and friends

Former Bashley player Mitchell Speechley-Price said: "My year at Bashley he was in the crowd. We may not have won

anything but (and I speak for my teammates that year) he certainly won our hearts."

> And former teammate Danny Webb tweeted: "Such awful news, was a pleasure to have met a man who made my time at Bashley so memorable, will always remember him and what he did for me "

Keith, who previously worked as a butcher at Lisa's Larder Farm Shop in Keyhaven, was diagnosed in March last year with

pancreatic cancer.

Writing before his death on a JustGiving page where he was raising money for Oakhaven Hospice and cancer charity Planets he revealed his time was short

Keith wrote: "There is nothing the hospital and doctors can do for me and they have handed me over to Oakhaven for any palliative care I might need in the not so distant future

"Right now I'm feeling okay and I'm trying to fill my days with the things I love most: my garden, family, football and working."

Over the past few months Keith had raised £685 for his chosen causes by holding a sponsored walk and football match along with charity raffle. He also hoped to raise enough money to help fund an electron beam intra-operative radiation therapy for himself or a later patient.

His death this week saddened many in the local football world with many clubs tweeting their condolences.

Blackfield and Langley FC tweeted: "From all of us to all of you – so very sorry to hear the sad news. We at IBlackfield and Langley FC] knew Keith well. Heartfelt condolences to you all. Much love to Keith's friends and family at this time."

Mangotsfield Utd wrote on their fan page: "He really was a larger than life character. He was a top bloke who supported Bashley, rain or shine, win, lose or draw."

Other tributes came from Fawley AFC, Sholing FC, Whitchurch United FC, Benerton Heath FC and Winchester City FC, as well as Andover New Street Football Club, Wimborne Town FC

Hamworthy United Football Club posted: "Keith was a lively 'ultra' to say the least and will be missed around the non-league circuit."

Townend Reds paid tribute to Keith's support, tweeting: "RIP #bashleylegend. What a guy. Sung on his own for 90 minutes at Banbury."

Friend Matthew Edmonds added on Twitter: "Having got to know Keith over the last 4 years, his passion, enthusiasm and love for the game was infectious.

"He's the reason I go to Bashley, the reason I'll continue to go home and away and the reason why Bashley is held in such high esteem."

Fellow fan Declan Skehan agreed: "His

passion and fight was always evident in everything he did. A true Bashley and Wessex League legend."

Kevin Small said: "Such sad news. Sometimes you meet a special person with bundles of enthusiasm, passion and a heart of gold.

"Keith was one of those people, a superhero who shone light wherever he was. Thoughts and prayers are with those of you lucky enough to call Keith Dad."

Away from the football ground, Keith Hill worked as a butcher Danestream Farm shop owner Paul Brolin

Danestream Farm shop owner Paul Brolin told how until he was too ill to work Keith kept coming in to the store to "make sure the lads were doing things right and having a laugh with them".

Paul said: "He was an absolutely fantastic man and really top of his game as a butcher. He made an instant impact with the customers, both with his expertise and the fact he was always joking.


"Keith was brilliant for the local community and of course the football club. He was passionate about football and people.

"When we learnt he was ill I told him his job was always here for him and if he wanted to come in for just an hour, or two that was fine.
