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Back to School: A Frosty First Week for Most

Starting off the new Spring semester, new and returning Brooklyn College students have found themselves contending with all manner of weather dynamics; with bitter chills to full on snow, students reflected on the affects these un-pleasantries.

"Its like January suddenly became the new December,' said Tyler M., a junior psychology major, inferring that January now be the most consistently cold and snowy month of the winter season.

Other students noted their surprise upon realizing the lack of cancellation of school even as temperatures as low as 10°F for most of the school day as was the case for Wednesday.

According to reports, Mayor de Blasio opted not to cancel schools citing the lack of accumulation of snow. For some students the weather's sudden change was most notably felt in their commute, which they would to describe as brutal, abysmal, and involved lots of waiting as transport came late leaving them coming to class tardy.

Even in class, an anonymous student referred to the heating and lack thereof in one early morning class in Boylan Hall as "barely enough" to sustain her from losing her patients and leaving class prematurely. Other students were able to look beyond the weather, keeping their main attention and focus on their studies rather than its environment.

"It wasn't so bad in class, just really cold," said Khilola Vahobova, a sophomore and member of the student government.

"I think that the only thing that I was on alert for was the new strict professors that I had been introduced to this past week," said Patrick Atwood, a junior English major, sharing an overwhelming sentiment by students electing to reserve their judgement until March.

"It was pretty bad on Wednesday and Thursday, but truth be told, I think it could and probably will worse later on," Atwood added. With the resumption of classes, and renewal of students on campus so too have student activities, clubs and organizations have kicked into high gear looking for recruitment and signatures.

Members of one such on campus organization, The New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG), the largest student directed advocacy group in New York reflected on the challenges of their latest exploits: signing students up to confront state legislatures in Albany over concerns contrary to student interests like tuition hikes.

"It's been a bit tricky," stated Patrick Kenani, one of two Project Coordinators in charge of the BC

NYPIRG Office, speaking in regards to the weather.

Jonathan Gaffney, another Project Coordinator mentioned the difficulty of being able to engage with students on campus, as noticeably fewer students stayed on campus and were open to a brief exchange via clip boarding and tabling.

tation we've been relying on," he added.

Still Gaffney like many other students and members of student groups have signaled that they'll be keeping their chin high for the remaining semester in spite of the potentially greater inclement weather to come.


Test Subjects Needed


The Dangers of Facial Recognition Technology

One of mankind's most groundbreaking advancements happened during the Industrial Revolution, where its inventiveness drastically elevated people's quality of life. Today, the world experiences the highest living standards ever recorded in history, with technological advancements that go beyond our materialistic needs. Today, the focal point of our technological pursuit is slowly tailored towards digitization as more and more of our everyday lives are affected by it.

Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella said to Fox Business News, "Everything that we think about, every place is being digitized, whether it's a retail outlet or a hospital, stadium, your home, or your workplace is increasingly computing [and] is getting embedded in the real world."

This rings true in describing how advanced we are with digitization. As more and more technological advancement happen, the tech sector is slowly garnering attention from other companies and even governments. Recently, a lot of the debates have been on the AI facial recognition technology. Word of its functions has enticed corporations and cities to reach out to tech companies such as Rekognition and NEC Corporation of America, a major supplier of the system. Facial recognition technologies have the ability to scan waves of people and at multiple locations at once, which would replace traditional methods of finding offenders by wait-

ing at the scene. It gives the police force an omniscient approach towards fighting crime and a better sense of safety for the people. So far, the city of Orlando, Florida and the Washington County in Oregon have been deploying this technology and other cities are seeking to follow their footsteps as well.

The magic behind facial recognition technology is in its biometric identification systems. It examines the physical features of a person's body such as fingerprint matching, eye scanning, and

voice recognition to distinguish one from the rest. From that, they take the image and run it through their database in order to see if a match can be found. The extent of its efficiency is recorded by Tara Francis Chan, a reporter for Business Insider, in an interview with local Chinese newspaper Worker's Daily. They said, "The system is fast enough to scan China's population in just one second, and it takes two seconds to scan the world's population."

This means, in under one second, the computer data-

base is able to scan the facial features of billions and individually run it through a database to find any perpetrators. The usage of it can be applied to the internet and in security cameras.

On the top of my head, I can think of many reasons on how this would be a good thing in helping to increase the safety of Americans. But beyond the optimism lurks a danger that threatens our freedom and liberty. If it ever becomes widespread, it can potentially give private corporations or the government

the power to identify anyone and their information without them ever knowing. Just like what happened in the Facebook-Cambridge Analytica scandal, more of that can happen in the future if we allow for the widespread deployment of this technology. How would you feel if no matter where you go, there is always someone watching you? Since technology is always being upgraded and tinkered with, what if this technology opens the door to something even more intrusive? We might just not be able to ever reverse it if it ever happens.

Whether or not facial rec ognition technology is good for the American people or not, is still a mystery to be solved. Our involvement in it is still not yet advanced and current regulations on it are still extremely limited. As facial recognition technology gets more and more popular in the tech world, only time can tell whether or not this technology fits well into the lives of the American people, and if we are willing to give up privacy for the price of increased safety.

Venezuela: The Fight for Power

The socioeconomic and political turmoil in Venezuela has been a persistent dilemma that has devolved into a parasite, draining the efficiency and legitimacy of the government. In just two presidencies, incompetence, corruption, and mismanagement brought the once reputed country to its knees.

That said, BBC also estimated that Venezuela may have double the Saudi oil reserves which has one of the largest known oil reserves in the world. What we should've done before imposing sanctions was to communicate with the United Nations about setting up a sort of aid for the people and then we follow up with sanctions.

In the past, we have many instances of being on the wrong side of history and supporting the wrong people. I believe that this is our opportunity to show the world that we are not who we used to be and is trying to bring genuine positive change to a very troubled region.




Let's Go to the Clinic!

AD Drama in New Orleans

Anthony Davis wants out. In the midst of the NBA season full of twists and turns, the New Orleans Pelicans star power forward has shaken the NBA landscape with an announcement that he wants to be traded and has no intention of re-signing with the team that drafted him first overall in the 2012 NBA draft.

Davis, who is the Pelicans' all-time leader in points, rebounds, and blocks, is not free to sign with another team until the summer of 2020. However, with one year left on his five-year, \$127 million contract, Davis is looking to still make the most amount of money possible without having to sign a max contract with New Orleans this coming summer.

Of course, money is only one of the reasons Davis wants out of the big easy as soon as possible, the other reason being that he is in the hunt for his first NBA championship. As Davis's agent, Rich Paul, made clear in an official statement: "Anthony wants to be traded to a team that allows him a chance to win consistently and compete for a championship," two things that the Pelicans have simply not been able to offer the player they planned to build a dynasty around back in 2012.

After years of roster in-

consistency, and mediocre playoff appearances, the only constant positive for New Orleans has been Davis, who has cemented himself as an elite NBA forward with legitimate MVP caliber play.

With this announcement, it seems like every NBA team is ready to partake in a bidding war for the superstar forward, however, many feel that Davis already has his eyes on what team he wants to bring his skillset to next.

In December, Lakers forward LeBron James told the media after a 112-104 win over the Pelicans that it would be "amazing" to play with Anthony Davis someday. The comments made by James caught fire as many felt he was tampering with Davis, considering he is still under contract with the Pelicans.

More fuel was added to the fire by the Pelicans organization after the team released a statement in regards to Davis's decision.

"Although we are disappointed in this decision, our organization's top priority is to bring an NBA championship to our city and build our team for long-term success," the team said. "Relative to

specific talks of a trade, we will do this on our timeline. One that make sense for our team and it will not be dictated by those outside of our organization. We have also requested the League to strictly enforce the tampering rules associated with this transaction."

As if the tampering allegations weren't controversial enough, the current collective bargaining agreement prohibits players or there agents from publicly requesting a trade. Davis has been fined \$50,000 for his statement and an investi-

gation has been opened by the NBA to rule out any more signs of tampering.

Of course, because Davis is still under contract with the Pelicans, the team has all of the leverage in regards to where he goes next. They can trade him to any team, or simply hold onto him, forcing him to sign as a free agent in 2020 and in doing so, lose roughly \$80 million.

No matter what the Pelicans decide to do, many feel that it is only a matter of time before Davis heads to the west coast to wear the patented purple and gold to play alongside LeBron James.

Some within the NBA feel that Anthony joining the Lakers could create a bad precedent, and that he playing for the Lakers should avoided. NBA analyst and hall of fame forward Charles Barkley had this to say on the matter:

"I don't like what the Lakers are doing. It's a collusion!" he continued, "We cannot have players and agents colluding to stack super teams."

Where Davis will play next is yet to be seen. Davis's announcement came days before the Knicks traded Kristaps Porzingis to the Mavericks after he voiced his frustrations with the team's direction.

It appears a new discussion must be had between the NBA and its players regarding player freedoms, as well as protocol to prevent any future tampering.
