



How to get to the TGH 3rd Annual Summer Celebration:

Saturday, July 27, 2019
10:00 am – 12:30pm

We strongly encourage people to **take public transportation** to the event.

Our celebration is a flat 10-minute walk from the **JFK/UMass MBTA Station**, which serves the Red Line, commuter rail, and bus lines 5, 8, 16, and 41.

Arriving by bus:

Bus 5 or 16: Ask the driver to let you off at this stop: Old Colony Avenue opposite Gavin Way. This is right next to a pedestrian bridge which can be used to cross over into the park.

Bus 16 or 41: Follow directions from JFK/UMass Station Arriving by MBTA Red Line, Commuter Rail, or bus: Go to main exit of MBTA station, in busway (do NOT use Columbia Road exit; it's way too busy) Walk under the underpass labeled "Columbia Road" - you'll be walking just next to the train tracks. You'll be on Old Colony Ave, though there's no signage saying this. Shortly after walking under the underpass, you'll see Moakley Park on your right. There is a pedestrian bridge in about 5 minutes' walk; you can use this to cross over to the park. (there's also a crossing where you can press the button for a WALK sign.

Within Moakley Park, our event is in the **exact middle of the park**: you'll see a soccer field surrounded by a rectangle of tall trees and a number of white tents clustered on the field. Follow the music!

*** **If you are driving** to the event, please be aware that non-permit parking is first-come, first-served, and will be very tight especially if it's hot and sunny. Moakley Park is a very large and busy park, with many other

sporting events going on at the same time as ours - and Carson Beach is a busy place on a summer weekend!

We strongly encourage people to take public transportation to the event. If you need to drive, there is free parking in two small lots along Day Boulevard; one on each side of the McCormack Bath House at Carson Beach. There is also free parking along Columbia Road both west and north of the park. This sounds like a lot of parking but Saturdays are very busy at the park! UMass-Boston has a public lot at their main campus (sadly, their much-more-convenient Bayside lot is closed on weekends), so in a pinch you could park there and then shuttle to the MBTA station and walk from there.
