Letter from National President

Publishing Policy

1.The objective is to publish a new Ozanam News, which will be issued three times per year, May, September and November. To facilitate this, a publications committee has been formed and a member of the National Council has been made responsible for its operation. The publications committee will normally meet two months before going to the printer. As at present, the actual putting together of the magazine will be the responsibility of the National Office staff, who will select the printer and liaise and coordinate with all preproduction functions. 2. In accordance with National Council requirements, the intention will be not to feature 'editorial' pieces. Any material deemed to detract from the Society's broader aims will be approved by the National Council prior to publication. Hopefully these arrangements will help the new Ozanam News develop into a more humorous, educational and spiritual publication which will concentrate on bringing the Society, its Members and Associates closer together. With this Togetherness in mind, National Council Agenda business could well become a regular feature in the magazine. In the main, letters for publication with an added footnote or returned for discussion by the respective council and/or president if thought to be more appropriate.

The International Association of Charities is a worldwide association of volunteers – mainly women – founded by Saint Vincent de Paul in 1617 to combat poverty. The Confraternities of lay volunteers help the disadvantaged in society. At grassroots level, individuals and volunteers respond to situations of poverty and suffering in a way that matches need with members' availability, skills and resources. The Daughters of Charity of St Vincent de Paul (DC), reach out to those who are poor wherever they may be. The forms of service the Daughters of Charity are engaged in at any given time, depends upon needs of those who live in poverty and their ability to respond. Daughters of Charity of St Vincent de Paul Services:

DCSVP Services inspires voluntary sector organisations to be innovative, sustainable and effective in their response to poverty in the UK. A key driver for the creation of DCSVP Services was identifying a need for change in the delivery of services due to the declining number of Daughters of Charity. Today, none of the subsidiaries are led by Daughters of Charity, although each have a minimum of two Daughters on their Board of Trustees. More information is available at www.dcsvpservices.org

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The Louise Project:

A subsidary of DCSVP Services is The Louise Project. The vision of The Louise Project is to enable individuals and families to transform their lives and their community and to intervene and change structures to take people out of poverty. To enable this to become a reality, their mission is to work with the poorest people in Scotland across five streams of activity; community drop in, building better futures, building for social justice, community integration and building community. The Space is the first initiative of The Louise Project and it serves dominant migrant ethnic groups in Govanhill, Glasgow, in particular the European Roma. Congregation of the Mission:

The purpose of the Congregation of the Mission is to preach missions to the poor, especially to the poor living in the rural areas who at the time of St Vincent, were abandoned by the Church. At present, the Congregation, often referred to as Vincentian Fathers, has 3,106 members living in 507 local communities in 95 countries on five continents. The Congregation is composed of priests and brothers, consecrated by vows to the mission of evangelising the poor. Their primary work is popular missions and lay formation. These missions might be short-term (3 to 5 weeks) or long term (six to ten years). Confrères are also involved in parish administration and higher education. Famvin is a global network of people, supported and connected by websites, for news, reference materials, formation materials and a variety of social networks. Famvin connects a community of more than 2 million people who seek to follow Christ, the evangeliser of the poor in the model presented by the life of Vincent de Paul and his collaborator, Louise de Marillac. Speaking earlier in the year, the President General International stated the following: "The Council General gives its full support to Vincentian children, teenagers and young people, because we do believe that they are a source of renewal for our Society. Today's young people will become tomorrow's Vincentian leaders." SSVP Scotland is eager to continue to show its commitment to young Vincentians and educational resources are part of this promise.

Following discussions with teachers at our annual Mini Vinnies Assemble and SSVP Youth days, the need for updated resources for Mini Vinnies and Youth SSVP meetings became clear. New and revised resources are now available online at www.ssvpscotland.com including starter pack information, PowerPoints, discussion activities, prayers and reflections.

These resources will provide young people with opportunities to continue to acquire and develop the attributes and capabilities of the four capacities as well as meeting the experiences and outcomes outlined in the Curriculum for Excellence. In addition, they directly link to the 'This Is Our Faith' syllabus for Catholic religious education in Scotland, which is published by the Scottish Catholic Education Service on behalf of the Catholic Bishops of Scotland.

Backing Shelter to end homelessness

- Report from SSVP Annual National Meeting 31st August 2019 - "Housing is a human right"

Key Note Address from Shelter Scotland, Lisa Borthwick, Senior Campaigns & Policy Officer and Cathy Steeghs, Adviser (Glasgow).

I was very kindly invited along to speak at the 2019 SSVP Scotland Annual Conference in August on housing rights in Scotland. Timing-wise this worked perfectly as Shelter Scotland had just launched a new campaign the week prior, which received a warm reception at the conference.

Shelter Scotland helps over half a million people every year struggling with bad housing or homelessness through our advice, support and legal services. And we campaign to make sure that, one day, no one will have to turn to us for help. We're here so no one has to fight bad housing or homelessness on their own.

Scotland has some of the most progressive housing legislation in the world, and over time people should be finding it easier to secure the safe home that is so vital to a fulfilling life. People don't know what their rights are and public bodies, struggling under the weight of cuts in services and increases in demand, are unable to enforce them. For thousands, a safe, secure and affordable home is still out of reach.

CELEBRATING 150 YEARS OF KINDNESS IN KILMARNOCK by Amélie Davidson

St Joseph's Church, Kilmarnock, Conference celebrated their 150th Anniversary on Sunday 9th June. In order to mark their work in Kilmarnock over the years, Bishop William Nolan of Galloway Diocese and parish priest Fr Stephen McGrattan celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving at St. Joseph's Church. The Church was packed with parishioners, service users, supporters and representatives of SSVP from the town and from other divisions in Scotland, including Mr Daniel Collins (National SSVP President) and Mr James Heneaghan (National SSVP Treasurer).

The first SSVP Conference to open in Galloway Diocese was in St Andrew's Church, Dumfries on 2nd February 1862. The next Conference to open was in St Margaret's Cathedral, Ayr on 1st November 1868, closely followed by that of St Joseph's Church, Kilmarnock on 1st April 1869. * 150 * 150 * 150 * 150

Kilmarnock also marked the anniversary by organising a collection of non-perishable items which were donated to St. Joseph's Church SSVP.

Alistair Thomson, President of St. Joseph's Church SSVP, said: "I have been a member of St Joseph's SSVP Conference for fourteen years. During this time, the help we have given to people has grown rapidly. "We have held a café group every Wednesday morning in the Church hall, since 2006. Each week, the recipients are given a bag of groceries, a ticket for lunch at the Howard Centre, and a cup of coffee or tea, biscuits and



sandwiches. At Christmas, we have a party where the recipients are given a gift ". Mr Thomson spoke of the difficulties faced by the people whom St. Joseph's Church SSVP help. "These visitors have a wide variety of problems - drugs, alcohol, loneliness, and those who have just been released from prison. They are vulnerable and in a fragile state.

Many lead lives which, to them, seem to have no purpose. Their lives are lived in grinding poverty and so they seem to have very little hope of change," he said.

Looking back at his time as a member of the SSVP,

Mr Thomson said: "The greatest satisfaction I receive comes from trying to give them a short respite from their troubles. A real affinity is developed with many of them. The lonely give you their phone numbers in the hope that, if you do not see them for a few weeks, you give them a phone call. This lets them know that they are wanted and respected. "These people have much to offer. They are human beings, many with a good mind and a good sense of humour. "To foster this, through regular contact, is a gift I receive from them. Just to see them smile and laugh is great. For this I am grateful. Long may it continue."
