

Summary

A young girl finds a starfish on the beach and wants to take it home to show it to her mother, but she doesn't want it to die. With encouragement from her dad and a little imagination, Ana is able to let the sea star go and yet keep it with her at the same time.

- Protecting animals in their environments
- Appreciation of the natural world and its creatures

- How does a sea star eat? Would you like to eat that way?
- How does a sea star move along the sand at the bottom of the sea?
- How does a stingray disguise itself under water?
- Why doesn't Ana take the sea star home to Mama?
- How does Ana help Mama see the sea star?
- Are you an invertebrate?
- Why should starfish be called sea stars? Why should jellyfish be called sea jellies?

Activities

- Go to the beach and look for creatures that are living there.
- Draw a picture of what you might see at the beach or under the water.
- Imagine that you are swimming underwater. Make your arms move as if you are swimming. Pretend you have gills that allow you to breathe underwater. Watch out for the turtles and sea jellies!

For Further Discussion

- How does litter on the beach hurt sea creatures? What can we do to keep our beaches clean?
- How can we draw pictures with our words? Tell your mother or father to close their eyes, then tell them what you did at school today. Use strong details so they can see your day in their minds.
