

Emperor Akihito thanks Japanese in farewell and prays for peace

Japanese Emperor Akihito, in his final remarks as his three-decade reign drew to a close on Tuesday, thanked the people for their support and expressed hope for a peaceful future.

- 1. For the first time in two centuries a Japanese monarch has stepped down.
- 2. On Tuesday, Emperor Akihito abdicated in a brief and relatively simple ceremony in Tokyo's Imperial Palace's prestigious "Matsu-no-ma", or Hall of Pine.
- 3. Akihito used his final words to thank the public and pray for peace.
- 4. About 300 people were there and the event was broadcast live on television for millions tuning in to the historic moment.
- 5. Akihito's three decade reign saw the Emperor seek to ease the painful memories of World War Two and engage with people, including the marginalized in society.
- 6. His abdication and unprecedented move for modern Japan has left the public stunned.
- 7. But at 85 years-old Akihito has had heart surgery and been treated for prostate cancer.
- 8. And has said he's afraid he can't carry out his duties as a monarch.
- 9. Many Japanese sympathize with him but not everyone.
- 10. Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's conservative base had objected to the idea of abdication mainly because the royals don't have many male heirs.
- 11. They're worried the next step might lead to women on the throne though the current law forbids it.
- 12. With the enthronement of Akihito's son on Wednesday 59-year-old Crown Prince Naruhito there are only 3 possible successors left and his own daughter isn't one of them.
- 13. When Princess Aiko was born in 2001 there was discussion of possibly changing the rules to let her reign - because there were no male heirs in the younger generation.

- 14. But still, conservatives resisted.
- 15. Then, Naruhito's brother Akishino had a son and lawmakers sighed with relief sweeping the issue under the rug.
- 16. Akihito was allowed to step down only after a special law was passed.
- 17. And an unprecedented 10 day holiday has been given to the public to celebrate Japan's NEW emperor.
- 18. Akihito will now be known as "joko" or emperor emeritus.
- 19. His wife, Michiko will be "jokogo."
- 20. They will leave the Imperial Palace and soon move into the Togu Palace where they lived, down the road before he became emperor.
