



Japan enthrones emperor in ancient ceremony

Japanese Emperor Naruhito formally proclaimed his ascendancy to the throne on Tuesday in a centuries-old ceremony attended by dignitaries from more than 180 countries, pledging to fulfill his duty as a symbol of the state.

- 2. While he officially began his rein in May, only now, through a series of rituals called the 'Sokui no Rei', is he enthroned.
- 3. He was clad in orange robes and a headdress only worn by emperors and stood alongside two of Japan's 'Three Sacred Treasures' an ancient sword and a jewel.
- 4. The new empress Masako- in her own throne wore 12 layers of robes.
- 5. Naruhito read out a proclamation:

NARUHITO OPENING UP SCROLL AND READING FROM SCROLL, SAYING:

- "I swear that I will act according to the constitution and fulfill my responsibility as the symbol of the state and of the unity of the people."
- 6. More than a hundred foreign dignitaries were in attendance, including Ukraine's Volodemyr Zelenskiy, Hong Kong leader Carrie Lam, and Britain's Prince Charles.
- 7. Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe led them all in giving three cheers for the emperor.
- 8. Banzai literally means 'ten thousand years' or long life, effectively, 'long live the king.'
- 9. Naruhito is unusual among recent Japanese emperors as his only child Aiko is a girl, and in current law, cannot inherit the throne.
- 10. Instead, the future of the imperial family rests on his young nephew Hisahito, who at 13 years old is second-in-line after his father.

- 11. Emperor Naruhito's ascension comes in the wake of Typhoon Hagibis over a week ago, a massive storm that left 80 people dead.
- 12. A parade where Naruhito 'meets the public' was delayed to November out of respect for the victims of the storm.
