## The First Ever GCCC Traffic Alert!

We're starting this edition of Notes and Measures with something I'd never thought I'd run: A traffic advisory. Starting today through November 6th, the City of Ventura will be repairing storm drains just east of Church of the Foothills on Foothill Road, between Colina Vista and La Fonda Drive. The city expects that the work will lead to road closures during that two-week period – which means you may need to alter your driving route to the church.

If you typically drive west on Foothill Road to get to the Church for rehearsals (for example, if you exit the 126 at the Kimball Road off-ramp and then make a left turn from Kimball onto Foothill), we recommend that you avoid this route; take Victoria Avenue north to Foothill and make a right to get to the church and to rehearsal. We'll advise you in future editions of *Notes and Measures* if the road closure's extended. ## Hints From The Handbook: Watch Liz. No, Really - Watch Liz!

It's time for another edition of our occasional series "Hints from the Handbook", where we take a moment to discuss important things you may have missed or forgotten from the GCCC Singers Handbook. Today's topic is something so important that we ask you to do it twice in the Handbook: Watch Liz – or whoever is conducting the Chorus - at all times.

For our newer singers, this may seem like an odd request – after all, we've been told since we were kids that it's not polite to stare. But there's a method to our madness, and we ask you to do it for a couple of important reasons.

First off, we all need to watch Liz so we that can keep from falling behind or getting ahead of the intended pace of the songs. It's very easy to get so lost in your music that you sing at the tempo you feel that the song should be sung, as opposed to the tempo that Liz wants us to sing it in. Liz may also choose to speed a song up, slow it down, or have the chorus hold a note, depending on how the song

is going, but you'll never know it if you're not looking!

If there's a break in the song, the best place to look for your cue isn't in your music folder, but at Liz. Worried that you might lose your place if you look up from your music? Liz will be silently repeating the lyrics as we sing; glance down at the words occasionally if you must, but your best bet for staying with everyone is to look up at Liz.

Last but not least, remember that the folks that buy tickets to our concerts are coming to see and hear <u>you</u>. They want to see your smiling faces, and they want to hear you clearly – neither of which will happen if you're staring down at your music or you're holding your music folder so high that nobody can see your face. Be sure to position your music folder so that you can see the music, but also so that the audience can see you – and of course, so you can see Liz. (Same thing goes when you're positioning yourself on the risers.)

If you have any questions about how to watch Liz and how to position your music folder, talk to your section leader.
