Mary Allegra, A Friend and Force of Nature

We were saddened by the loss of Mary Allegra, Garden Court Community Association President, this past August. Reproduced here are some thoughts on our dear leader and friend from fellow GCCA Board Member, Liz Campion.



Mary Allegra was a star; not always visible in a day-lit sky, but always present to light easier paths for family, friends, neighbors and even strangers. Mary lit up a room, laughed often, was passionate and silly, forgave, and accepted forgiveness. She was brave, smart, funny, and refreshing. She made her own luck, (with intense preparation). She lived fully present in each day, while planning for the morrow. Mary knew that life was a time to make good friends and have great adventures. She knew the best stories, and could share them, because she lived them with us.

Mary feared little. A recent illness made her contemplate dependency and pain, and so, her relatively quick death, at the end of an almost perfect day, surrounded by those she loved most, can be considered a blessing. We are left to deal with the shock and loss, finding solace in many happy memories and the supports of the traditions and 'guide ropes' she wove around and through her lucky beloved. Misty Copeland says, "Anything is possible when

you have the right people to support you." Mary was that "right person".

Mary was unapologetically herself, and an inspiration (sometimes hard push) to those striving to lead a better life. She gave us the freedom to be our best selves. She knew joy was contagious and smiles were a symbol of peace and proof of connection.

Mary could simultaneously be a traditional 'Catholic wife' and a liberal and liberated warrior. She fought for peace, and as a young woman followed Frank from Boston to NYC to help counsel young men trying to avoid the Vietnam Draft (encouraging conscientious service elsewhere; not faking "bone spurs"). I am just one of many people who is glad her path led them to Philly.

Mary had few prejudices and a plethora of preferences. She was fast and flexible in her thought processes and implacable in her moral compass. She built without destroying. Hard work was made fun: All senses were engaged. Her path through life made time for detours through the arts (culinary, dramatic, music, ornamentation, and photography). She could overlook a broken fence to admire the flowers in a garden, and as a gourmet level cook, she realized an egg, (or friend), is still good, even if cracked.

Mary made and retained friendships because she was a good friend. Just one example: when I was battling cancer, she cooked for me, and offered her husband Frank as chauffeur. She demonstrated friend-love by walking in, when many others disappeared. Other examples include the many dinners and parties she hosted to celebrate victories and raise money in support of scholarships and the goals of others.

Mary's achievements were remarkable, and listed in more formal obituaries. For now, I prefer the comfort and reminiscences of those who knew and loved her. At her memorial service, one of the speakers reminded us that someone who might have been defined, as 'one of the usual suspects' was the son of her heart. He credited her generosity, with food and housing, for helping him past a rough patch. The evidence is of a strong, healthy, and loving man, able and willing to pay her kindness forward.

My favorite Mary story, highlights her love of Frank and how misunderstandings can be positive.

At a neighborhood Christmas party, women had drifted to one area and men another. Mary began bragging about her good fortune in being married to Frank. Among his good qualities: "Frank delivers coffee to me, in bed, every morning". Many women felt a twinge of jealousy, and I joked that she was making Frank a target for all those women who might want him as their own personal "Mr. Coffee". Of course, I later shared the story with my husband, with a suggestion that he step up his 'morning game'. Larry rose to the challenge. Over the course of the next year, Larry went through three types of bean grinders, culminating in a hand turned, ceramic grinder he now uses. He began comparing beans and roasters, to find my favorites. And is now friends with Joe Linn of LITTLE GOAT, the best coffee roaster in Delaware. We graduated to an espresso machine. Now he makes a weekend Latte for me and the volunteer who gardens in our courtyard. There is a punch-line. At the next Christmas Party, I thanked Mary and told how Larry was in a happy competition with Frank. At which point, Mary laughed and said, Frank brings me instant coffee. It was our 'inside joke' for years. I am drinking a home-brewed latte as I write my memories. (Thank you, Mary!)

Friends are the relatives we make for ourselves. At times, Mary played the role of Mother, Sister and mentor. I was lucky to know her. I delight in seeing the Chi-Adults, especially Jen's theater friends, and Chris's jock cohort, who benefitted from her love. Mary knew that growing up and independent did not mean growing apart. And she was delighted when the arrival of grandchildren brought her own children closer as peers through the shared experience of parenting.

Mary understood that friendship is a renewable resource. It enables growth; empowers children to attain a more productive adulthood; and neighbors to overcome artificial differences to join on common ground.

I am awed that her husband of 48 years, Frank was able to plan a funeral, and host a reception (for hundreds) at their home. It was as if Mary was there, helping everything run smoothly. (Special kudos to caterer, FRESH ON 47TH. Barbara Scott and team brought amazing, tasty food and made set-up and

clean-up appear seamless). It was a beautiful send-off in the ALLEGRA style. Her children, Jennifer and Chris, (with wife Jen), her grandchildren Claire, Michael, and Lin Rose, family from Boston and Plymouth, friends and neighbors kept the mood upbeat.

Mary made our world better by feeding, comforting, entertaining, and inspiring the people in it. She was not just a good friend; she was the great friend who delivered chocolate (or wine, or whatever was most needed). She was the incredible friend, who was reliable and loyal and who made a difference. Like Maya Angelou, Mary knew to, "Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better." Doing better, for me, will include supporting the people and institutions Mary loved. Frank will always be welcome at our home for Sunday dinners. Isabel Allende said, "True friendship resists time, distance and silence." I trust that Mary will enjoy eternal rest in perpetual light, and that those who love her will meet again.

Honoring a Dear Friend

Mary's life was celebrated at a Memorial Service on October 19, 2019 at the Mosaic Community Center.

Frank Allegra, Mary's husband, was chosen by the Board of Directors in a special election to complete Mary's term on the Board.

A Legacy Committee will be established to develop a fitting tribute in Mary's Honor.


