Ed's Journal© is an engaging comic strip of characters that experience real world dilemmas designed to increase moral reasoning and strong character building skills. Each story is told with three alternate paths. Giving the child an option to learn what can happen when choosing an in-correct path. Each Character has an identity that all children can relate too; given the child the ability to connect with one of the main characters.

The main purpose of the illustrations and stories is to teach and demonstrate core values and high ethical standards by focusing on systemic teaching of common values through the use of character building words a/k/a "Character Education." The art and writing is designed to not only enhance moral reasoning capability but also improve the learning environment and enhance student achievement. Each book called Ed's Journals© giving at-risk, average, and high-achieving children from diverse backgrounds the tools and the inspiration they need to develop a strong character base for his or her future

THE BOOKS

Each journal has important values embedded in each of them, there are a wide variety of activities that teachers and parents can utilize to help children comprehend and get involved in the story's real life dilemmas.

BOOK 1 - DEPENDABILITY: How Dependable do you think you are? Are you a friend that can be counted on to return things when you borrow them? Follow along with Ed and see if he can be counted on to return a borrowed item before it's too late.

BOOK 2 - HONESTY: What would you do if you found something that doesn't belong to you. Find out what Ed does when he comes across something that doesn't belong to him.

BOOK 3 - LOYALTY: When friends count on you to be somewhere very important and you do not show up. Does this make you a loyal friend?

BOOK 4 - MOTIVATION: Ed is finding it harder and harder to continue creating his journals and he is not motivated to continue. Corey and Jade want to help but need the right motivational path.



BOOK 5 - SELF CONTROL: Ed is picked for the School Carnival booth and finds himself trying to control his temper. With Corey and Jade pushing Ed to do something he doesn't want to we find Ed in a certain situation that can lead out of control.

BOOK 6 - LEADERSHIP: The ability to lead is a powerful tool and this responsibility falls on those who except the challenges that fall upon them.

BOOK 7 - SPORTSMANSHIP: Recess is a great time to let off steam. However things can quickly get out of hand if Jade can't show great character.

BOOK 8 - SELF RESPECT: Ed has entered a skateboarding contest at the Skate Park. The contest is over and Ed's trick doesn't go as planned. Katie being Katie starts to disrespect Ed and his friends about his skateboarding.

BOOK 9 - FAIRNESS: Ed tells a story that finds Jade in a situation where Katie makes her choose between her friends.

BOOK 10 - BULLYING: A rumor is started about Ed and Jade. As they try to handle the rumors Jade quickly finds herself in a bullying situation.

Book 11 - Responsibility available Nov. - Dec. and as well as many more books coming to help improve a child's character.

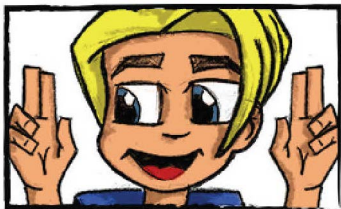

THE CHARACTERS





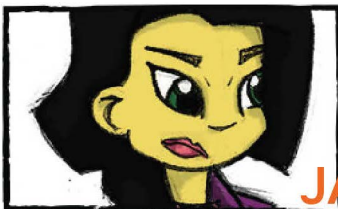
ED

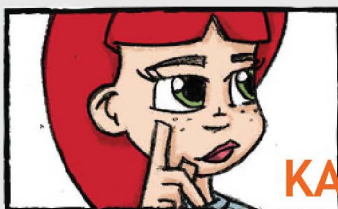
COREY

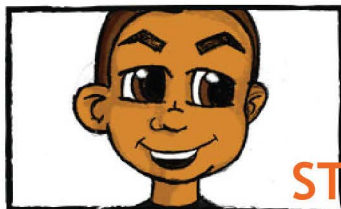
JADE

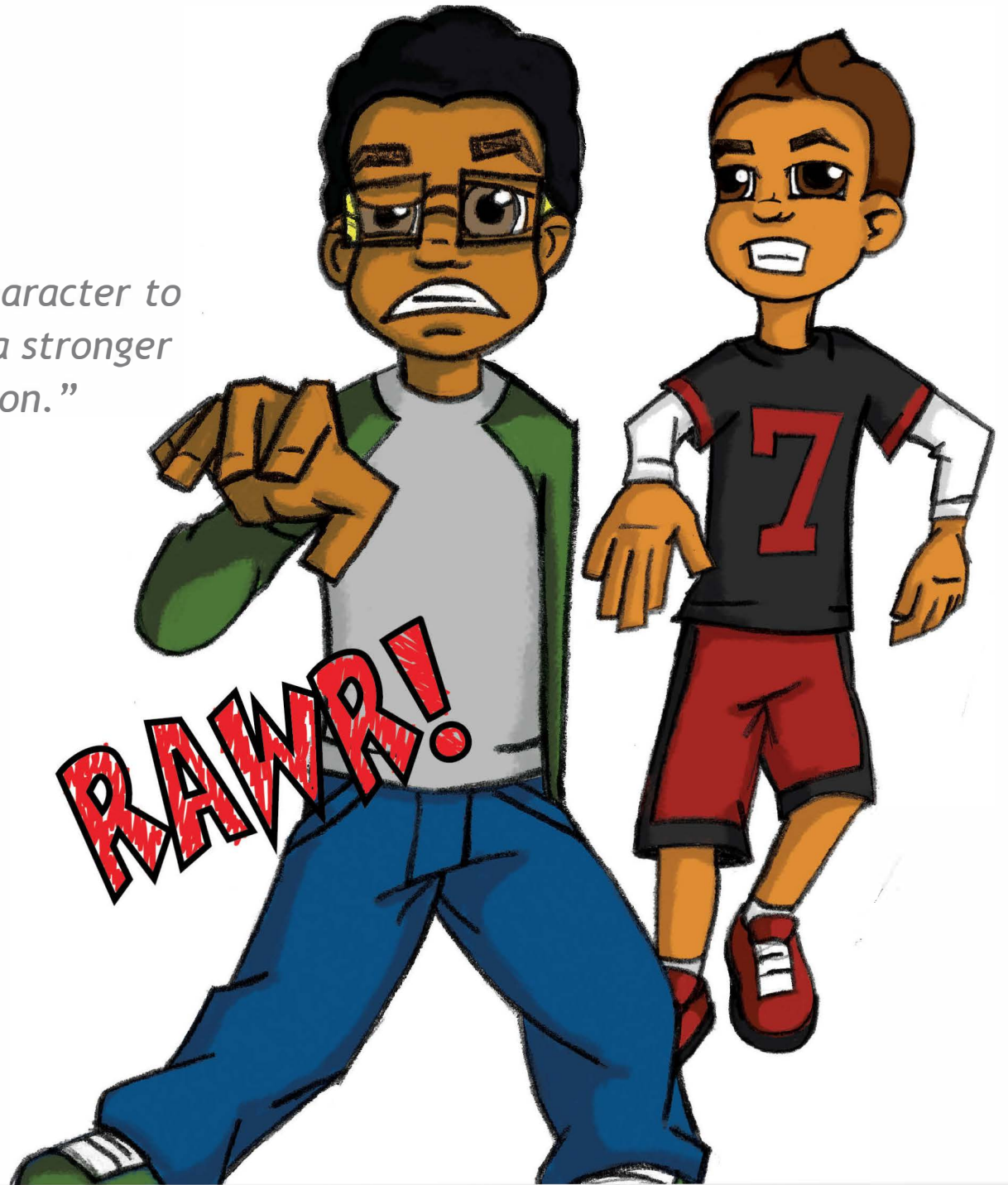
