Human sexuality is a topic on which people of faith have differing views. Despite our differences, the people of Hygiene UMC, will continue to work together to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and share God's love with all people.

There is no change in our current hospitality toward all people. We welcome everyone to our church and want them to find a loving faith home at Hygiene UMC.

Part of a statement from the Council of Bishops says:

The General Conference is the highest legislative body in the church and the only group who can decide church law and speak officially for the global denomination. The 864 delegates (half lay, half clergy) from all over the world met from Feb. 24-26 to discuss and act on the report of the Commission on a Way Forward over the issue of human sexuality. The delegates also considered petitions other than the report from the Commission.

The decision of the General Conference was to offer a majority support for the Traditional Plan. The vote was 438 to 384. The delegates then voted to ask the Judicial Council, the highest court in the denomination, to review the constitutionality of the approved legislation.

The Traditional Plan keeps the current language around sexuality and increases accountability by streamlining the processes to enforce penalties for violations



of *The Book of Discipline* related to marriage and ordination of LGBTQI persons. Some parts of the Traditional Plan were ruled unconstitutional, and it will take some time to clarify which parts will become part of our church law and which parts will not.


Prayers



This Advent Study will be a small group discussion format, led by Pastor Rick Stewart.


Study books are available during fellowship time or by contacting Pastor Rick. If you would like to help with the cost of books, a donation of \$10 will be accepted.

Book Review: Wearing the Red Bandana



Margie Warsavage, one of a handful of writing enthusiasts in the small HUMC congregation, has written a highly entertaining and readable book, which can be enjoyed in a few hours.

In Red Bandanna, Margie offers a family memoir based upon family stories, memories, and her own personal research and travel.

The tale begins with Margie's grandfather, a cowboy in the earliest days of the settlement of the Rocky Mountain West, wrangling cattle on the long drive from Texas to the spring and summer pastures of Southeastern Montana.

The book is titled after her childhood memory of a garment critical to comfort on the long dusty drive; it is sprinkled with poignant and loving personal tales of courage and triumph, but also details remarkable difficulties and even devastating tragedy on the frontier.

As the narrative, and delightful story-telling, moves forward in time, the setting moves with successive generations of the family from Montana, to the western slope of Colorado, to Denver, and then Fort Collins.

Throughout the book, Margie's generous personality, intellect, curiosity, and love of her family and its remarkable story are evident. The reader is able to know her better through this heart-warming family story of the West; I recommend it.
