Study Questions: Chapter 7: “Wasn’t There Another Way?” (part 1)

1. As Jones observes on page 125, “If you can’t imagine how God could have done better,” then saying “ ‘I don’t know—I’m not God’ is a copout”¹ Why is this a copout?
2. Jones quotes a famous (former) atheist, Antony Flew. Flew said God might have “created people who would always as a matter of fact freely have chosen to do the right thing.”² Recall what Jones observed in our last chapter: “A being isn’t morally free unless she can choose to use that free will wrongly.”³

Read Proverbs 16:9, Ephesians 2:1-3, and Romans 6:17.

Are we free, or does God determine everything?

3. A compatibilist “believes that even though you can never do other than you do, a person is still free as long as he is doing what he *wants* to do.”⁴

In other words, the concept that people have free will is *compatible* with the belief that God determines every thought or deed so that they could not have done other than they do unless God were to otherwise will it.”⁵

Read 2 Samuel 24:1, Acts 2:23, Acts 4:27-28, and Genesis 50:20.

Do you think Scripture supports compatibilism?

4. A libertarian (aka an incompatibilist) believes that the statements “you have free will” and “you can never do other than you do” are *incompatible*.

Read 1 Corinthians 10:13. Compare Exodus 4:21 and Exodus 8:15.

Do you think Scripture supports incompatibilism (aka libertarian freedom)?
